



## RJC Standards Committee 2016

The RJC Standards Committee is comprised of 28 Members: 14 industry representatives (two from each forum of the diamond, gold and platinum jewellery supply chain, and Members of the RJC) and 14 members representing various external stakeholder groups, of which 2 are permanent representatives from capacity building groups supporting artisanal and small scale mining and who the RJC has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with, the Diamond Development Initiative (DDI) and the Alliance of Responsible Mining (ARM). Current there is 2 vacant seats for the external stakeholder groups and one vacant seat for the industry representatives.

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| <p><b>Coventry University, Centre for Business in Society (CBiS)</b></p>             | <p>She studied for her first degree in Marketing at the University of Strathclyde and gained her PhD at the University of Birmingham in 2001. Her academic career extends over 25 years with posts at a number of UK universities, during which time she has earned a reputation as an expert in the field of corporate social responsibility, marketing ethics and ethical consumption behaviour. Research partners outside of academia include industry practitioners and trade organisations such as Responsible Trade Worldwide, the Ethical Trade Initiative, and the British Jewellers Association.</p> <p>Her past research pioneered work on the implications of attitude-behaviour gaps for ethical consumption. Her most recent work has focused on corporate social responsibility among small businesses in the jewellery industry, and the consumption behaviour of jewellery consumers. Professor Carrigan’s current research into CSR and small firms is breaking new ground, particularly on the implications for responsible business practices in the supply chain for small businesses/entrepreneurs. This challenges some of the assumptions that CSR is mainly about multinational enterprises and upstream activity. She has investigated this in the context of the luxury fashion industry, and more recently focusing on the UK jewellery industry.</p> <p>Prof. Carrigan has published more than 100 academic papers in peer reviewed publications with co-authors from across the world, and she serves on the Editorial Advisory Boards for The International Marketing Review, Journal of Social Marketing, as well as the Journal of Marketing Communications. Her research has been funded by the British Academy, the Economic and Social Research Council and the Regional Studies Association.</p> <p>Before joining Coventry University, she was Deputy Director of The Institute for Social Marketing (ISM) at The Open University.
