RJC vision and mission


Our **vision** is a responsible world-wide supply chain that promotes trust in the global fine jewellery and watch industry.

RJC Code of Practices

- Launched in 2009
- Assurance of a company's business practices
- Compulsory for RJC members

Member Certification

Chain-of-Custody Standard

- Launched for precious metals in 2012
- Assurance that metals are from responsible sources and certified at every stage of the supply chain
- Voluntary for RJC members



Aims of the COP

- Provide a common standard for RJC members
- Set out the mandatory expectations for designing and implementing relevant policies, procedures and practices
- Establish provisions that can be independently audited
- Drive better business practices for positive impacts
- Mitigate present and future environmental and social supply chain risks






RJC standards review





Review of standards follows ISEAL code

Member engagement and public consultation

RJC Code of Practices (COP)

- Standard launched in 2009
- Compulsory for RJC members
- First review completed 2013
- Current review from Q2 2017 to Q4 2018

Chain-of-Custody Standard (COC)

- Standard launched 2012
- Voluntary for RJC members
- First and current review from Q3 2016 to Q4 2017

Process for reviewing the COP

1. Planning phase – what topics do we need to review?

- Log of issues, questions from helpdesk, nonconformances
- Publish a 'Public Summary', a document outlining the plan for the review of the standard

2. Review and consultation phase – what changes will we make?

- Commissioned research on key topics
- Consultation with members and stakeholders (workshops, webinars, email campaigns)
- Publish a draft of proposed changes
- Optional additional revised changes and consultation

3. Finalization phase

- Standards Committee, ExCo and Board
- Legal review

Process for reviewing the COP

Planning; revision and consultation; finalization

Purpose of the review of the COP is to:

- Address questions from 5 years of application (since last revision)
- Reflect developments in the industry and in best practices

COP review process so far

Phase 1: Review of Scope (Public comment period: July – August 2017)

- · Undertake gap analysis and stakeholder mapping
- . Open first public comment period on scope of review (minimum 60 days, Jul-Aug 2017)
- · Publish summary of comments received
- · Facilitate dialogue on input received with RJC Standards Committee
- · Research and draft proposed changes

Phase 2: Draft 1 (Public comment period: March - April 2018)

- Open second public comment period on proposed changes to COP and key guidance (minimum 60 days, Mar–Apr 2018)
- · Publish summary of comments received
- Facilitate dialogue on input received with RJC Standards Committee
- · Research and redraft proposed changes

Phase 3 (optional): Draft 2 (Public comment period: August 2018)

- Open third public comment period on revised changes for outstanding issues (minimum 30 days, Aug 2018)
- · Publish summary of comments received
- Facilitate dialogue on input received with RJC Standards Committee
- Implement final changes

Approvals for finalisation (November – December 2018)

- RJC Standards Committee recommends approval (or not) of the revisions based on the results of public commenting,
- RJC Executive Committee and Board of Directors approve revised COP based on the committee's recommendation (and the quality of the process followed)
- · Carry out legal review of drafts
- Publish revised COP (target date: Dec 2018)

Topics for reviewing requirements (significant to medium changes)

- Detection and disclosure of synthetic diamonds
- Due diligence and Know Your Counterparty (KYC)
- Incorporate coloured stones in COP
- Mining sector: water management and community engagement

Detection and disclosure of synthetic diamonds

- Review need for minimum requirements on detecting undisclosed synthetic diamonds. Review disclosure requirements regarding detection approach used.
- Consider key references (De Beers Best Practice Principles Disclosure Practice Note, World Federation of Diamond Bourses Charter on Disclosure of Synthetic, Treated Natural and Natural Diamonds)



Due Diligence and KYC

Why change?

- Due diligence is a responsible business practice
- COP already covers due diligence under Human Rights (COP 6.2) same process, applied to broader set of risks

Review:

- Develop a specific provision on due diligence for managing risks to human rights and sourcing from conflict affected and high risk-areas
 - Alignment with EU regulation
 - Review relevant provisions from Chain-of-Custody Standard
- Identify different requirements for types of companies in supply chain
- Re-organise and building on existing COP requirements i.e. human rights, KP and SoW, sourcing from ASM, business partners
- KYC: new requirement to check relevant government sanctions lists
- Money laundering: review financial thresholds for maintaining records of cash transactions

Scope expansion to coloured stones

- Incorporate coloured stone requirements into COP (approved by RJC Board in 2016)
- All COP provisions will apply: legal compliance, labour rights, health, safety and environment, etc.
- Topics to review include:
 - Responsible sourcing (including from ASM), due diligence and KYC
 - Health and safety
 - Hazardous substances
 - Product disclosure
 - Grading analysis and appraisal
- Scope: at least sapphires, rubies and emeralds potentially more





Water management

 Review the need for specific requirements on water management for mining companies beyond the general provision on water management in COP 25

Community engagement

 Review requirements for inclusion of in-migration, and for measuring impacts on communities

15	Remuneration	Review need for guidance on remuneration for apprenticeships/trainees in India.

37	Mining sector: tailings and waste rock	Review international mining guidelines for coverage of tailings and waste rock management (for example, Towards Sustainable Mining Tailings Protocol).
