1. General Review

Incorporate Platinum Group Metals in COP

 Platinum Group Metals added to RJC scope in 2010 and Chainof-Custody Standard in 2012.

Clarity on laboratory-grown diamonds in COP

Glossary definitions and application of general provisions.

All implementation feedback on standard, guidance and assessment questions

 Review log of questions and feedback since COP launched in 2009, identify opportunities to enhance clarity, consistency and ease of use of documentation.



2. Specific Topics for Review

- Human Rights
- Child Labour
- Free Prior Informed Consent and Indigenous Peoples
- Mining in Conflict Zones
- India Factories Act and Provident Fund

The Review process will draw on key references to update the standard and/or Guidance in these areas in consultation with stakeholders.

SA8000

 SA8000 is an international certification standard for improving working conditions, based on the principles of thirteen international human rights conventions.

Global Social Compliance Program (GSCP)

 GSCP was created by and for global buying companies wanting to work collaboratively on improving the sustainability (social and environmental) of supply chains.

Certification Scope

 Identifying whether a Member represents all relevant parts of a business, rather than a subsidiary of a larger parent group.

Round 1 Comment - Review of Scope - June-September 2012

- Gap analysis and stakeholder identification conducted, and proposed scope for new standard/revision prepared with the Standards Committee for public comment;
- Public comment period 1 of 60 days proposal and draft scope (this document);
- Facilitate dialogue on input received with RJC Standards Committee;
- Publish summary of comments received and how they will be addressed in draft revision.

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Round 2 Comment - Draft 1 - Nov 2012 -Jan 2013

- Public comment period 2 of 60 days draft revision 1 of standards;
- Facilitate dialogue on input received with RJC Standards Committee;
- Publish summary of comments received and how they will be addressed in next draft.

Round 3 Comment - Draft 2 - May - June 2013

- Public comment period 3 of 60 days draft revision 2 of standards, draft 1 of guidance
- Facilitate dialogue on input received with RJC Standards Committee;
- Publish summary of comments received and how they were addressed in final version
- Where outstandig issues exist, a final consultation period of 60 days (draft 3 of standards) may be conducted.

Approvals - September - October 2013

- Legal review of drafts;
- Recommendation by the RJC Standards Committee whether to approve the new standards / revisions, based on the results of the consultations;
- Recommendation by the RJC Executive Committee based on the above recommendations;
- Decision whether to approve the new standards/revisions taken by the RJC Board, based on the quality of the process followed.
- Target publication of revised COP: October / November 2013.
